

WHY VOLUNTEER?

The LSBA's motto, "*Serving the Public. Serving the Profession*," reflects its commitment to enhancing legal access. Despite overwhelming legal needs in Louisiana, the ratio of eligible individuals to legal aid staff attorneys is 22,500 to 1. **Volunteer attorneys are vital** in bridging this gap. *Your help, even just a few hours, can greatly benefit those in need.*



MALPRACTICE COVERAGE FOR VOLUNTEERS

Volunteer attorneys are covered under the LSBA's malpractice insurance when they are volunteering at LSBA events.



HELPING COMMUNITY

Over 74% of low-income households in the U.S. experience at least 1 civil legal problem in a year. Nearly 20% of Louisianans live in poverty. You can help your community by addressing those unmet legal needs.



ACCESS TO TRAININGS & RESOURCES

To help assist with pro bono sessions, volunteers have access to trainings and resources on a variety of topics, including a list of other free legal resources to refer patrons to.



CLE CREDIT

Louisiana Supreme Court Reg. 3.21 states lawyers can earn CLE credit by doing pro bono work. A lawyer can earn 1 hour of CLE credit for every 5 hours of pro bono work, up to a maximum of 3 hours of CLE credit per year.

EVENT OVERVIEW

Ask-A-Lawyer sessions are 2-hour events where patrons to meet one-on-one with an attorney for 15–20 minutes each to ask questions about their individual legal issues. As a volunteer, you can provide as much information and guidance as you feel comfortable communicating. You can also direct patrons to free and low-costs legal resources in the “Resources & Referrals” list (pg. 15), which includes contact information for legal aid & pro bono organizations, resources for self-represented litigant, & additional resources.

Phone consultations are a way to reach patrons who may not be able to get to the library for an event. To sign up for the virtual option, select *Virtual Calendar* from the drop-down menu at <https://lil.ivolunteer.com/2024> and select the days/times you wish to volunteer. In the week prior to your event, we will email you a list of patrons and their phone numbers for you to call during your scheduled time slot. We will make every effort to match you with patrons from your own parish.

If a patron does not answer when you call, you can leave the following message:

“Hello, this is [name]. I am an attorney volunteering with Lawyers in Libraries. I am calling regarding your legal question and will try calling back at [time]. If you receive this message after that time, you can submit your question online at LA.FreeLegalAnswers.org, or visit www.lsba.org for more resources.”

Opting to be an "On-Call" volunteer means we can contact you during the week of Lawyers in Libraries (**Oct. 21-26, 2024**) to possibly cover any Ask-A-Lawyer sessions that had a last-minute cancellation by their volunteer attorney. On-Call volunteers may be asked to handle phone consultations or in-person consultations if the library in need is nearby.

Lawyers in Libraries will again host attorneys for virtual webinars on timely legal issues, broadcast on the [“LSBA Louisiana Lawyers in Libraries” Facebook page](#) throughout the week of the program. Past topics have included divorce and custody, successions and estate planning, bankruptcy, and more. We encourage you to share our promotional posts on your library’s Facebook page to help spread the word.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Library patrons will come with all kinds of questions – about divorce, custody, successions, housing issues, and more. As a volunteer, you are *not* expected to be an expert in every area or to give more than basic information. Feel free to give patrons as much guidance as you feel comfortable sharing and direct them to the resources we have in this guide. Many times, people are simply looking for a place to start, and finding out about a local resource or program can be invaluable.

In an Ask-A-Lawyer session, patrons must sign an intake waiver stating that getting a lawyer's help isn't guaranteed. Attorneys fill out a form at the session's end, detailing the discussed issue and assistance level. This data helps local legal aid groups and future events. Completed waivers should be handed to library staff afterward.

NOTE: If you are volunteering by phone, all the patrons participating by phone were asked to agree to the waiver before signing up.

We encourage libraries to contact local media outlets to promote their upcoming event. Attorneys should advise the participating library whether they want their name & firm acknowledged. Included in this Guide are a sample Press Release & sample flyers libraries may use to promote events. Attorneys can also advertise events on their own social media, etc.

Yes! Attorneys can obtain CLE credit for the pro bono work at a rate of 1 hour of CLE per 5 hours of pro bono representation, up to a maximum of 3 CLE credits per year. If an attorney provides 2 hours of pro bono assistance with 'Lawyers in Libraries,' they can apply for 2/5 of CLE credit . To apply for CLE credit, complete the form on pg. 17 and email it to stephanie.beaugh@sba.org.

CHECKLIST FOR ATTORNEYS

1 Sign Up

- Sign up for one or more time slots at <https://lil.volunteer.com/2024> for the week of **October 21-26**. Select the library branch location you would like to volunteer at using the drop-down menu (or select "Virtual Calendar" to participate in phone consultations). Events typically are scheduled in two-hour time slots, 9:00 AM through 7:00 PM.
 - ****IMPORTANT:** After signing up, you will receive an automated email with a link to confirm your appointment. You must click this link to confirm your appointment.*** 

2 Connect with Libraries

- Once registered, LSBA staff will confirm your event(s) & e-mail introduce you to the contact for the library branch(s) you chose.
- Volunteer attorneys are not allowed to directly solicit clients at the event, but they can inform their partner library if they would like their name or firm included in promotional materials.

3 Pre-Event Promotion

- The LSBA promotes all events via LSBA publications & partner organizations. Libraries will also promote these events to their patrons. See Sample Media Documents in this Guide.
- Attorneys are encouraged to promote the program to any media contacts or to colleagues & encourage other attorneys to volunteer. You can share any of the materials in this Guide.

4 Pre-Event Organization

- Review the "Event Overview & FAQ" and "Trainings & Resources for Volunteer Attorneys" materials included in this Guide.
- In-Person Ask-A-Lawyer consultations- Please confirm with the library that they will print copies of the Sign-up Sheet, Intake Waiver Form & the "Resources & Referrals" list. You may also wish to confirm details such as what space the library will use for the event, who will meet you when you arrive, whether you will have WiFi access, etc.
 - *Sign-up Sheet* (pg. 12) – The library may post the Sign-Up Sheet in advance of the event or use it to organize walk-in patrons on the day of the event.
 - *Intake Waiver* (pg. 14) – All patrons who meet with you must sign an Intake Waiver acknowledging that you are not providing legal representation.
 - *Resources & Referrals List* (pg. 15) – A list of free & low-cost legal providers and resources in Louisiana.
- Phone Ask-a-Lawyer consultations: About a week before the event, LSBA staff will email you the list of patrons to call during your time slot.
 - Phone consultation patrons agreed to the terms of the Intake Waiver when signing up ahead of time.
 - Print or have open a copy of the "Resource & Referrals" list for your own reference during calls. You can also download the resources and flyers individually at www.LouisianaLawyersinLibraries.org to send to patrons via email if you feel comfortable.

CHECKLIST FOR ATTORNEYS

5 Day of Event

- Ask-A-Lawyer sessions at the library - Please arrive 15 minutes ahead of your scheduled time to get set up. Patrons may have sign up ahead of time, or the library may have you take patrons as they come. Have each patron sign an Intake Waiver Form before meeting with them, and plan to spend 15-20 minutes with each person discussing their legal issue. Once your session concludes, return the completed Intake Waivers to library staff.
- Ask-a-Lawyer phone consultations - Plan to spend 15-20 minutes on the phone with each patron assigned to you during your time slot.
 - If a patron does not answer when you call, you can leave the following message: *"Hello, this is [name]. I am an attorney volunteering with Lawyers in Libraries. I am calling regarding your legal question and will try calling back at [time]. If you receive this message after that time, you can submit your question online at LA.FreeLegalAnswers.org, or visit www.lsba.org for more resources."*
- Please take pictures of the event! To protect people's privacy, please avoid photos of the patrons attending the events. However, we encourage you to take pictures with library staff and pictures of yourself volunteering to use for future event promotion.
- Participants are likely to have legal issues that may be outside your practice area. As a volunteer, you are not expected to be an expert in any one area or to give more than basic information. Feel free to give patrons as much guidance as you feel comfortable sharing, and direct them to the resources we have listed in this guide.

6 After the Event

- Please return completed Intake Waivers to the library.
- Send any pictures of the event to lawyersinlibraries@lsba.org.
- To receive CLE credit, fill out and submit the CLE credit form included in the materials. Submit forms to lawyersinlibraries@lsba.org.
- At the conclusion of the week, all volunteers will receive a follow-up survey via email. Your feedback is greatly appreciated and helps us improve the event for future years.

Regulation / Rule 3.21. Credit may also be earned through providing uncompensated pro bono legal representation to an indigent or near-indigent client or clients. To be eligible for credit, the matter must have been assigned to the Member by a court, a bar association, or a legal services or pro bono organization that has as its primary purpose the furnishing of such pro bono legal services and that has filed a statement with the Louisiana State Bar Association MCLE Department. A Member providing such pro bono legal representation shall receive one (1) hour of CLE credit for each five (5) hours of pro bono representation, up to a maximum of three (3) hours of CLE credit for each calendar year.

This attorney-library partnership is a critical one in a state where nearly 20% of the population lives below the federal poverty line, with many more just barely making ends meet. Many people need legal assistance but cannot afford an attorney or don’t know where to start. The Lawyers in Libraries program allows participants to get basic information on their legal issue and be connected to further free and low-cost legal resources. Attorneys can answer questions on a wide range of civil legal topics such as: Bankruptcy, Collection Matters, Custody, Divorce, Evictions, FEMA/Disaster Benefits, Food Stamps, Foreclosures, Housing, Medicaid, Social Security, SSI/SSDI, Successions, Taxes and Wills, and more. (The program does not address criminal matters.)






CUSTOMIZING FLYERS



The **Modest Means Online Legal Directory** is an online listing of attorneys who charge reduced rates. Those who qualify can view the list and directly contact an attorney.

To use the Directory, your income must fall at or below 400% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (see chart). Before using, you must agree to the terms and input your household income and family size.

Once determined eligible and the list appears, **you can choose an attorney** you would like to reach out to and contact him or her directly using the contact information provided. There is no cost to use the Directory.



Your annual income based on household size must be at or below this amount to view the Directory:

LA.FreeLegalAnswers.org is for those who need legal information but cannot afford to hire an attorney. Legal questions submitted to the site will be reviewed and answered by a Louisiana licensed attorney. There is no cost to post a question or to receive an answer on the site.

There are income eligibility requirements for those who want to use the site.

Users must meet the following requirements:

- ◆ Be 18 or older
- ◆ Not currently in jail or prison
- ◆ Have a household income within the federal poverty guidelines

This site ONLY allows civil legal questions – no criminal legal questions will be answered by volunteer attorneys.
