- Serve on the Diversity Pipeline Subcommittee** (meets about once a month, usually by phone)
- The Pipeline Subcommittee of the LSBA Committee on Diversity strives to volunteer and identify volunteers for programs to expose children to legal professionals; to develop programs to encourage students to consider the legal profession as a career choice and increase their chances to successfully matriculate through law school; and to develop professional development workshops and programs for law students with diverse backgrounds.

Assist with the LSBA High School Summer Institute & Internship Program: “Suit Up for the Future” (June 22, 2011 through July 25, 2011) by one or more of the following:

- Present a class
- Allow a student participant to shadow you at your firm
- Chaperone a field trip
- Serve as a guest lecturer

- This five week course will allow ten to fifteen bright students to attend a mini-law school camp. In the first week, the students will attend lectures each day and during the remaining four weeks, the students will shadow identified legal professionals. The students will also participate in field trips and seminars.

Make (one-hour to one-day) presentations at elementary schools, middle schools, and high schools for Career Day, Street Law, Constitution Day, Law Day, civic classes, EDUTAINMENT assemblies, and related programs, *schedule permitting*

Make (one-hour to one-day) presentations to middle school students in POWER TIES, *schedule permitting*

- POWER TIES, which is sponsored by the Young Leadership Council, “is a career awareness program that links professionals from various occupations with middle school students at Langston Hughes Academy, McDonough City Park Academy and Arthur Ashe Charter School through a series of career-oriented workshops. The YLC operates this program in cooperation with New Orleans Outreach.” (<http://www.youngleadershipcouncil.org/site53.php>)

Advise/Coach a high school mock trial team in the LSBA Young Lawyers Section’s Louisiana High School Mock Trial Competition

- “The Mock Trial program is a competition that has two purposes. The first to teach high school students basic trial practice skills. Students learn how to conduct and direct cross examinations, how to present opening and closing statements, how to think on their feet and learn the dynamics of the courtroom. Students will also learn how to analyze legal issues and apply the law to the facts of the case. The level of skill shown by the students is extraordinary, and it is due to the dedication and hard work of both the students and their teacher-coaches and attorney-advisors. The second and the most important purpose of this competition is to teach professionalism. Students learn ethics, civility, and how to be zealous, but courteous, advocates for their clients.” (<http://www.lsba.org/YLS/index.asp>)

Teach a law class once a week for four weeks in the Urban League of Greater New Orleans’ College Track Program

- COLLEGE TRACK is a law seminar within the Urban League’s semester after-school program. It “is the catalyst for change for under-resourced high school students who are motivated to earn a college degree. . . .College Track supports motivated students to succeed in high school and graduate from college. . . . by setting high expectations and providing rigorous academic preparation, opportunities for leadership development and enrichment, and guidance through the college application and selection processes through our three core services areas: Academic Affairs, Student Life, and College Affairs.
