1:05 - 2:05 pm **Three AI Skills Every Lawyer Needs Now -- Whether You Use AI or Not**

Generative AI is reshaping legal practice, and it will affect your work whether you use it or not. Your clients are using it to research their own legal problems. Your associates and co-counsel may be using it to draft documents you will sign. Opposing counsel may be using it to produce the briefs you are reading. Each of these scenarios creates a professional responsibility obligation that does not depend on your own AI adoption. This program grounds those emerging obligations in existing Louisiana Rules of Professional Conduct and recent case law. As AI systems become more fluent and generate fewer obvious errors, the skills that protect lawyers and clients are not technological. They are professional: critical thinking, critical reading, and the ability to exercise judgment over a tool that has none.

This session will provide civil legal aid attorneys with practical tools for identifying immigration-related issues that arise in the context of housing and family law matters, with a focus on issue-spotting and connecting clients to appropriate referral resources.

Louisiana has an estimated 175,000 parcels mired in heir property, and when those properties intersect with unpaid taxes, the stakes are high and the law just changed. This session prepares practitioners to recognize the problem however it presents, understand the January 2025 shift from tax sales to tax lien certificates, navigate notice requirements and redemption timelines under the new system, spot conflict of interest risks when legal aid organizations have existing relationships with co-owners, and identify the range of options available to clients, from partition and succession to administrative challenges and lien termination.

- Working with ASL Interpreters: Attorney Obligations and Effective Client Communication**

Attorneys have an ethical and legal obligation to communicate effectively with every client, including those who are Deaf or hard of hearing. Failing to secure a qualified ASL interpreter, misunderstanding who is responsible for doing so, or failing to understand how ASL interpretation actually works can compromise that obligation. This session will cover the ethical duties, legal requirements, and practical realities attorneys need to know when representing Deaf and hard-of-hearing clients. Topics include the attorney's duty to retain a qualified interpreter as a matter of effective client communication; the distinction between a court-appointed interpreter and an attorney's table interpreter; ADA obligations and new LCD registry requirements; and how ASL's spatial structure creates interpretation gaps that attorneys must understand to fulfill their duty of competent representation.

Presenters will address practical strategies for issue-spotting across practice areas, discuss how incarceration affects clients' relationships with systems and institutions, and share tools for counseling clients who may be reluctant to engage with the legal system.

From funding shortfalls and program cuts, to new proposed work requirements, eviction rules, and immigration status restrictions, to the rollback of fair housing protections and enforcement, low-income families and unhoused people remain under attack. At the same time, Congress has passed the largest bipartisan housing legislation in nearly two decades. This session will look at recent and pending federal legislation, rulemaking, and

other HUD activity that impacts access to housing. We will also discuss new Louisiana legislation that criminalizes unhoused people and how it intersects with federal policy changes.

Beyond the Individual Trust: Leveraging Pooled Trusts to Access and Preserve Benefits in Elder and Disability Estate Planning

Pooled special needs trusts represent a critical mechanism for preserving public benefits while meeting the ongoing financial and care needs of individuals with disabilities and older adults. This session will provide a detailed examination of the statutory and regulatory framework governing pooled trusts, including 42 U.S.C. §1396p(d)(4)(C), Social Security Administration interpretations, and key Louisiana Medicaid policy guidance. The discussion will highlight practical limitations, compliance requirements, the importance of comprehensive planning, and other planning tools, such as Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) Accounts.
