



Sally J. Kenney has served as director of the Newcomb Institute and held the Newcomb endowed chair since 2010. She is a faculty member in the Political Science Department and an affiliated faculty member in the law school. Her research interests include gender and judging, judicial selection, pregnancy discrimination, gender-based violence, and women in prison. Her latest book is *Gender and Justice: Why Women in the Judiciary Really Matter*.

A native of Iowa, Ms. Kenney earned a B.A. in Political Science from the University of Iowa, a B.A. and M.A. in Politics, Philosophy, and Economics from Magdalen College, Oxford, and an M.A. and Ph.D. in Politics from Princeton University. She has held faculty positions at the University of Illinois, the University of Iowa, and the University of Minnesota.

She has worked with the National and International Associations of Women Judges and worked with judges in Kenya, Brazil, Pakistan, Tbilisi, Georgia, and Egypt. She is a co-founder of the Infinity Project to increase the gender diversity of the state and federal bench to ensure the quality of justice in the Eighth Circuit.
